Starry theme for Christmas Wassail - Tickets now on sale!

Nine years ago the Chorale introduced its first-ever "Wassail" and Noosa crowds still love it.


Last year was another sell-out as audiences reveled in the genial atmosphere of bonhomie and hearty Christmas Cheer, sitting at "cabaret-style" tables, having a few drinks, and enjoying complimentary mince pies, cheese platters and Christmas cake.

And let's not forget joining the choir with the sing-a-long from word sheets of well-known carols, among which this year are the old favourites "Oh Little Town of Bethlehem", "The First Nowell" and "Oh Come All Ye Faithful."

This year's theme is "STARS" and you can expect something heavenly from Wassail coordinator Gai Ramsay who, with help from twinkling-star designer, soprano Jenny Jackson and others, is planning to transform the J into a wonderland filled with sparkling Christmas scenes and festive décor.

Music director Adrian King (and father of the Chorale's annual Wassail) has selected famous British composer Benjamin Britten's celebrated and hugely popular "A Ceremony of Carols" to punctuate the programme.

The carols in Britten's inspired work are largely drawn from anonymous 15th and 16th century writers. Each carol has its own distinctive identity—from the joyously forthright "Wolcum Yole!" through to the lyrical, the swinging, the fiery and the dramatic.



The harmonies are rich and colourful, showing off Britten's genius when it comes to composing for voices in harmony. And to keep you in the Wassail mood, the choir will be singing the work in Old English which Britten used extensively throughout.

Wassail is derived from the Old Norse ves hael or from a later time the Anglo Saxon waes hael. Depending on how you feel at the time it can be a toast of a drink like mulled ale or a party, particularly at Christmas.

It's easy to imagine roistering Vikings hallooing Wassail as they dip their beards into their tankards or 12th century English peasants warming up to the winter weather with a Christmas carol or two and a hot mug.

Flash forward a few centuries and Wassail still means fun, roistering and enjoying the Christmas season with your friends—Noosa Choralestyle.
