Chorale handles Messiah superbly!

Noosa Chorale kick started its 20th anniversary celebrations with a glorious performance of George Friderick Handel's Messiah at The J at Noosa Junction on Sunday June 8. Possibly it was because the singers were conscious of the importance of the birthday moment but rarely in its 20 years has the choir reached such a level of intensity and excitement.

And this was appreciated by the enthusiastic audience who were enthralled by the combined contribution of the soloists Gaynor Morgan, soprano, Sarah Court, mezzo soprano, Nick Kirkup, tenor and Sam Piper, baritone, the orchestra, Noosa Sinfonia, and the choir all under the control of Adrian King who communicated powerfully the grandeur of Handel's great work.

Perhaps the highlight was the encore of the Hallelujah Chorus. In 1999 conductor Leonard Spira arranged for the words to be handed out to the audience so they could join the choir for the encore. It was such a wonderful idea the Chorale decided to do it again this year and the words were printed in the program and placed on seats.

From the President

What a fabulous concert our inaugural performance at The J was. In his message of thanks to the Chorale, Adrian King referred to the countless messages of praise that had been received—not only from the members of the audience but also from the orchestra and soloists. The success of this concert is a tribute to the close collaboration between the Chorale and management and staff of The J theatre where the Chorale has now taken up happy residence. As we go through our review, we're identifying things we can do differently to make the next concert experience an even better one.

Choir members have immediately thrown themselves into the preparations for the Gala Concert in October, with the rehearsal term seeing us stretch our singing over several centuries of choral history and styles. The Beethoven Choral Symphony is a challenging

piece, especially for the sopranos who have to hit the top Bs. Maybe in Beethoven's day, it was easier to sing a top B because the orchestral instruments were probably tuned 20Hz lower then. Thanks Huguette for that insight—maybe now the sopranos can forgive Beethoven.

We'll be performing again at The J for Noosa Council's Citizenship Ceremony on Tuesday 1st July at 10:00am, so any singers out there who want to join in singing the Australian Medley and the National Anthem in 4-part harmony are welcome to join in—but let me know first.

Good to see Jackie and Jeremy back with us after their sojourn in South Africa. We had a great farewell for John and Yvonne Woodlock at the Noosa Arts Theatre last Saturday afternoon. Good luck also to John Pennell and Glenn on their trip and lan and Anne Jobling on theirs.

At Adrian's invitation the audience stood and sang with the choir this most popular of sacred choral works. It was a roof lifting moment.

Two records emanated from the concert. Performers totalled 110 and never in the last 20 years have there been so many and, for the first time, the upper mezzanine level of The J had to be opened up with 60 seats to accommodate the large numbers of Chorale enthusiasts. It was a full house and some people who had hoped for door sales were disappointed.

Which brings me to the Chorale's next


